## Implementation of New DG (Distributed Generation) Rate Rider

RCEC successfully filed and has implemented rate changes (riders) necessary to assure that members choosing to install a distributed generation system (DG system), continue to pay their share of the costs of construction, operation and maintenance, of the RCEC electric system that are incurred by RCEC to serve these members. DG systems include but are not limited to solar panels and small wind generators.

The proposed changes to RCEC's Rate No. 1, General Service, Rate No. 2, Commercial Service and Rate No. 3, Irrigation Pumping and Dryer Service will enable customers with DG Systems to continue to reduce their monthly bills for wholesale power generation and transmission costs. However, these customers will also continue to pay their share of the fixed costs of the Cooperative that are incurred by RCEC to make service available to these DG System owners when such service is needed.

Under the new DG rate rider, each General Service DG, Commercial Service DG and Irrigation Pumping and Dryer Service DG account will now be subject to a facility charge and a meter read billing charge. The DG Facility Charge will vary depending on the size of the DG system installed.

RCEC recognizes that members have made a significant investment in their DG system; therefore, members who have installed or made application to RCEC to install a DG system prior to October 1, 2021, have been "grandfathered-in" for the life of the DG system or as long as the original members who installed the DG system are still the original owners. # **Community Solar Act of 2021**

On April 5, 2021, Governor Michelle Lujan Grisham signed the Community Solar Act into law which became effective on June 18, 2021. This Act requires the NM Public Regulation Commission to adopt rules to establish a community solar program no later than April 1, 2022. In essence, the community solar program is still under development. This new law includes an "opt-in" provision for rural electric cooperatives which means that a rural electric cooperative **is not required** to participate BUT may "opt-in" to a specific project should the associated board of trustees chooses to. In RCEC's case, this would require that our wholesale energy provider, Western Farmers Electric Cooperative, Inc. (WFEC) wishes to participate because we are legally obligated to purchase all of our generation from them. RCEC is able to engage in small solar or small wind projects that are "behind the meter" resources but is still required to report these to WFEC. These behind the meter projects are monitored through a net-metering process.

RCEC has received numerous calls and visits from members who have been approached by solar entities wishing to engage in solar projects that would be designed to attach to our electrical infrastructure. Many of the calls we've received include the desire of the solar entity to utilize 40 acres of land which is typical for about a 5MW installation of solar generation equipment. 5MW, as most of these solar entities know already, is the maximum size under the Community Solar Act on a per project basis. Unfortunately, RCEC will not be able to entertain any of these community solar projects without the consent of WFEC.

Delinquent nonresidential accounts without a continuing letter of guaranty from financial institution are required to pay a deposit equal to 25% of the delinquent bill. On 3rd consecutive delinquency, a deposit equal to 1/6th of the estimated annual billing will be assessed.

#### **Residential Deposits**

For residential consumers a deposit equal to 1/6th of the estimated annual billing is required if the account becomes delinquent three or more times in one year. After that year, the deposit may be refunded and applied to the next month's bill provided the account has not been delinquent in that year. If a service is disconnected, the deposit is applied to the final bill if all requirements have been met.
